Large Language Models (LLMs) as a Prior Art for Patents and Patent Applications

Al is transforming various industries, including the patent industry. LLMs have gained significant attention in recent years across a variety of industries due to their remarkable ability to process and generate human-like text. Some applications include language

Greenwashing and Navigating the FTC's Green Guides

Organizing Committees: U.S. Trademark Law & Litigation and Green IP

This year the FTC is releasing an update to its Green Guides. The Green Guides provide marketers with guidance on environmental marketing claims, including how consumers are likely to interpret particular claims and how marketers can substantiate these claims to avoid deceiving consumers. In advance of updating the Green Guides, the FTC received nearly 60,000 responses to questions it posed about frequently used environmental claims, ranging from "low carbon" to "net zero" to claims concerning the recyclability, sustainability and compostability of products. As consumers have focused their purchasing on environmentally friendly products, brands have expanded their marketing and advertising to include a variety of claims touting their products as safe for the environment. The FTC and courts have also become more focused on ensuring that marketers' "green" claims are truthful and accurate. This session will discuss the FTC's Green Guides, recent FTC actions to enforce those guides, and trends in consumer class actions and other litigation around green claims.

Guidance for Patenting Al-Related Inventions and Registering Copyrighted Works Incorporating Al-Generated Material Organizing Committees: U.S. Patent Law & Litigation; Copyright & Related Rights; Al, Data and New Emerging Technologies, U.S. Patent Office Practice; and Software Related Inventions

Courts in the U.S. and other countries have ruled that works of authorship and inventions generated solely by AI are not copyrightable or patentable – human authorship or inventorship is required for IP rights. It is crucial for design and development teams, which often create both works of authorship and inventions, to understand the differing standards of human contribution required for copyright and patent protection. This session will help companies navigate these issues by first discussing guidance from the Copyright Office on its standard of human contribution and requirements for registering copyrights for works containing AI-generated material. Patent Term Adjustment

Organizing Committees: Canadian Practice, International Patent Law & Trade, Latin American Practice, and Asian Practice Patent Term Adjustment (PTA) extends the term of a patent for unreasonable prosecution delays by a patent office. PTA was first introduced into the United States patent prosecution process by the American Inventors Protection Act of 1999. Under the United States-Mexico-Canada Trade Agreement, Canada and Mexico are obligated to introduce PTA into its patent prosecution system by January 1, 2025. Mexico's new IP law that entered in force on November 05, 2020, contemplates PTA but not PTE and applies for all applications filed in Mexico from November 05, 2020, and onwards. China implemented PTA as part of the Fourth Amendment to the Chinese Patent Law, which came into effect on June 1, 2021. A decision from the Brazilian Supreme Court in November 2021, seems to have introduced the possibility of PTA for patent owners which demonstrate an unreasonable, unjustified, and exceptional delay of the Brazilian Patent and Trademark Office in granting the patent application. Speakers will compare PTAs in the different jurisdictions, including determining which patents are eligible for PTA, request PTA, calculate PTA, challenge PTA assessment, and define its relationship with Patent Term Restoration.
